


In 2015, we shared close to 84,000 items from book and magazines to audio books, music CDs, DVDs, E-books, and flash cards to help people earn US citizenship.


HIGHLIGHTS OF 2015

Our Summer Reading Program draws more than 3,400 people over a sixweek period for a series of week-long camp sessions, focused on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) Learning.

Our popular Battle of the Books programs keeps kids in 6th-9th grades reading during the summer, and helps foster a love of reading for pleasure.

We expanded our partnerships to work with the Rec Park, hosting weeklong Maker Camps.

We partnered with Red Hook Central School District to provide programs for teens at the high school.

























OUR VALUES

EXPLORATION:

We believe curious minds never stop looking for new opportunities to learn.

In 2015, nearly 10,000 people attended 638 programs hosted by Red Hook Public Library. Folks learned to speak Italian and Latin, raise bees and chickens, make their own wine, trebuchets, and tap maple trees. We've tangoed on our front porch, held our first-ever Chocolate Olympics, and did the limbo at Monster Mash. The good people of Red Hook can sleep easily, knowing an elite squad of teens has been trained to survive a zombie apocalypse.
